Fix debt for free

Owing money and missing repayments can be stressful, so the last thing many people in financial difficulty need is to be charged more money for help getting their debt under control.

That's why Consumer Protection urges consumers to choose free debt management advice where possible over other high-cost options.

While debt management service companies may claim to be able to fix debt problems, these businesses charge fees and may not always be able to resolve the issues.

Some consumers have reported signing contracts and then discovering a caveat has been put on their home.

In a move designed to help protect consumers, all debt management firms will be required to hold a credit licence for the first time from 1 July 2021.

While this reform to Australia's consumer credit laws is an important step, consumers need to know that they can often get this type of assistance for free.

Financial counsellors provide free debt advice and negotiate with telcos and utility companies to pay in instalments or defer payments, while community legal centres can offer free legal help to those in need.

Whatever your situation, if you are struggling to repay your debts then don't be embarrassed to seek help from free services to work through your options and understand what can and can't be fixed.

Don't let wedding planning tie you in knots

Your wedding can be one of the happiest days of your life, but it may also end up being one of the most expensive.

Covering the costs of all the things you need, such as a venue, catering, outfits and equipment hire, can soon add up – so it's important to be across your consumer rights before you start shopping around.

With more than 9,500 weddings taking place in Western Australia last year, there are times when things don't go exactly to plan.

Businesses closing down, not being able to contact traders and items not matching the description or samples are just some of the issues Consumer Protection receives complaints about when it comes to weddings. We also hear about disputes when it comes to bonds, deposits and payments, as well as suppliers taking money for things they can't provide.

Consumers should be aware that goods provided should be of acceptable quality and services should be delivered with due care and skill. This means that a wedding dress should match the description given, suppliers should supply on time and the venue should be fit for purpose.

Before you begin to pay for products or book services, it's important to research the business you're thinking of choosing by checking online and asking friends or family for reviews. This will help prevent any hiccups from happening before or on your wedding day.

When it comes to making payments, you should avoid paying the full amount upfront unless you're receiving the goods or services at the same time. Instead, pay only a reasonable deposit – we recommend no more than 10 per cent if possible, with progress payments as and when things are supplied.

Avoid paying by EFT (electronic fund transfer) and instead consider paying by credit card or selecting 'credit' on your debit card, as it may give you an option to dispute the transaction if you don't get what you paid for. Paying by PayPal is another secure payment option.

Many Budget Benefits for Durack

13 May 2021

This week's Morrison Government Budget sets the nation on course to secure Australia's strong economy with a focus to create more jobs and set the country up for future prosperity.

The Federal Member for Durack, the Hon. Minister Price said as a result of the hard work of the Federal Government and many in Durack during this challenging time, I am thrilled that there will be some direct tax benefits out of Budget 2021-22.

"Around 60,500 taxpayers in Durack will benefit from tax relief of up to \$2,745 this year. This budget extends the low- and middle-income tax offset to 2021-22 and brings forward Stage 2 of the Government's tax relief plan. This is additional to the Government's Tax Plan that has already benefited 74,400 people in Durack," Ms Price said.

"An extended and expanded JobTrainer Fund will support 500,000 new places to upskill job seekers and young people. We already have 4,335 apprentices in Durack and these new measures will lead to more opportunities for apprentices and trainees with expanded wage

subsidies." Ms Price said.

In support of Durack agriculture and a broad range of businesses, the Morrison Government is continuing tax incentives that will allow around 20,000 businesses in Durack to write off the full value of any eligible asset they purchase.

"As well, the \$160 million Agricultural Supply Chain Improvements - Package 1 will cover a lot of the Durack Ag regions creating the opportunity for various rail upgrades and local roads impacted by grain freight and other heavy industry. There is a total commitment of \$530 million for major infrastructure roadworks crucial to agriculture, tourism and resources across Durack," Ms Price said.

As a member of the Prime Minister's Cabinet Women's Sub-Committee, I am particularly proud of this budget's investment of \$3.4 billion in women's safety, health, and economic security.

"This includes almost \$354 million for women's health including more than \$100 million for improvements to cervical and breast cancer screening programs. Importantly for rural and remote women, the Breast Cancer Network Australia also has more funding to operate its advice helpline," Melissa Price said.

Assisting Durack families, there is a very welcome increase to childcare subsidies available with more than one child aged five and younger in childcare, and the removal of the \$10,560 cap.

The Morrison Government is providing additional investments in respiratory clinics, pathology testing and tracing, and the continuation of telehealth services. In Durack there

have been 135,463 telehealth consultations through Medicare since the start of the pandemic and these services are now being extended

"The record investment in Aged Care will help the 18,182 senior Australians living in Durack. This investment will deliver more home care places, more funding for residential aged care and increases the amount of time residents are cared for while strengthening regulators to monitor and enforce the standards of care," Ms Price said.

"At the other end of the age spectrum, unfortunately suicide remains the leading cause of death for Australians between the ages of 15–44 years. The Morrison Government has recognised this, by investing \$2.3 billion in the National Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Plan to lead landmark reform in mental health support and treatment for Australians in need. This includes treatment centres for adults, youth and children through the Head to Health and headspace programs," Ms Price said.

With Durack's large Indigenous population, I welcome some of the very constructive job and education reforms.

"To ensure employment services fit the changing job market in remote Australia and meet the unique needs of job seekers in remote communities, the Government will introduce a new remote jobs program in 2023. It will replace the Community Development Program (CDP). This new program will be developed in partnership with communities and will complement the broader New Employment Services Model being rolled out in the latter half of 2022," Ms Price said.

I welcome the steadfast leadership of Prime Minister Morrison and Treasurer Josh Frydenberg which has created a budget for our times as the economy continues its pandemic recovery, with many benefits for my Durack constituents.

Increased Assistance for Cyclone Seroja Clean-Up 20 May 2021

As we mark Volunteers Week 2021, it is important to thank and acknowledge the very impressive clean-up efforts by community volunteers, shires, the Australian Defence Force and State Emergency Service members across the vast coastal and inland Mid-West regions impacted by ex-Tropical Cyclone Seroja.

Federal Member for Durack, the Hon. Melissa Price has welcomed the Morrison Government extension of its support to the many who continue to clean up and rebuild their lives since ex TC Seroja hit the coast near Kalbarri and cut across over 130, 000 square kilometres from the coast to inland in April.

"I have visited many of the impacted communities again recently and I am impressed at the progress that had been made. I am proud that these committed communities will now have access to more financial assistance through the further extension of the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA)," Ms Price said.

The expanded DRFA is available in the local government areas of Carnamah, Chapman Valley, Coorow, Dalwallinu, Dandaragan, Greater Geraldton, Mingenew, Morawa, Mount Marshall, Northampton, Perenjori, Shark Bay and Three Springs.

The Commonwealth-State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements had already been activated in the immediate response to Severe Tropical Cyclone Seroja. This extension now includes Category C and Category D measures which increases the level of assistance available including to small business, farmers, restoration activities for community, recreational, cultural, heritage and environmental assets

"The expanded level of assistance will fund a clean-up program and community recovery support package for 13 local governments affected with costs covered on a 50:50 basis by the Australian and Western Australian Governments." she said.

This support includes five community recovery officers will be employed over two years to work across the impacted local government areas and support the long-term recovery of those communities. The recovery officers will establish a local presence and work with local governments and not-for-profit organisations.

Federal Member for Durack, the Hon. Melissa Price said these projects will make WA roads safer, reducing travel times and supporting thousands of jobs across Durack.

"From the north to the south of my vast Durack electorate, I am thrilled that many will benefit with the investments in the continued upgrading of the Great Eastern Highway in the Wheatbelt to the Great Northern Highway in the Kimberley, "Ms Price said.

"The Morrison Government's ongoing funding commitment is boosting businesses and communities across Durack, as part of the Government's National Economic Recovery Plan. This includes a regional focus on the 'WA Agricultural Supply Chain Improvements' project to better connect Durack's world-class farmers to domestic and international markets," Ms Price said.

- \$48 million Marble Bar Road Upgrade
- \$44 million Indian Ocean Drive, Jurien Bay to Brand Highway

Labor confirms plans to diminish regional representation

17 May 2021

The Nationals WA have slammed the Premier and WA Labor during Parliament this week for misleading regional voters of their intention to introduce so-called one-vote-one-value electoral reform prior to the State election.

During a Legislative Council debate, Member for the Agricultural Region Hon Martin Aldridge MLC said the official State Government response had made it clear Labor was pursuing mathematical equality ahead of effective regional representation.

"Not only did the Premier repeatedly mislead voters about his intention to silence regional voices, but Labor's hand-picked panel of Perth academics has given voters just weeks to make a submission on an issue with major long-term ramifications for our democratic process," he said.

"The Ministerial Expert Panel chaired by Malcolm McCusker QC does not come to this issue with clean hands, having long advocated for greater metropolitan control of the Parliament. This raises serious questions as to whether the committee will give fair unbiased consideration of all views."

Mr Aldridge said effective regional representation was essential to addressing regional issues such as health and education outcomes, serious injuries and deaths on our roads, cost of transportation and access to reliable telecommunications that unfortunately affect regional communities more than metropolitan areas.

"It was also damning that no Labor regional MP contributed during the debate yesterday – this Party continues to claim it represents regional interests but will quickly align to abolish it when it fits their city-centric agenda."

The Opposition also questioned why the Attorney General announced that a Discussion Paper would be released by the Committee two weeks into the consultation process, leaving only two weeks for submissions to respond.

"Publishing a discussion paper halfway through the process is further proof of Labor's intention to ram through electoral reform no matter what submissions are made," she said.

"The one week extension of the submission deadline announced today is tokenistic and the whole process should be seen for what it is, a complete farce.

"We urge all Western Australians to speak up on this important matter, it's not right for Labor to use its massive majority to ram through reforms that will significantly impact our State, in particular regional Western Australians, for generations to come."

Submissions to the Ministerial Expert Panel now close at 5pm on Tuesday 8 June 2021.





Disbursements to begin for people with homes destroyed by Tropical Cyclone Seroja

Payments of \$25,000 will be made available for every house classified as totally destroyed following Tropical Cyclone Seroja cutting a path of destruction through Mid-West communities last month.

A further \$10,000 is also available for every property assessed to have suffered major damage making it uninhabitable, such as loss of roofs.

The amounts apply to both owner/occupiers and tenants of properties at the time the tropical cyclone struck and all affected properties must be the primary place of residence.

A team on behalf of the Lord Mayor's Distress Relief Fund (The Fund) will travel to the affected region on Monday to support and assist local governments in establishing the application process.

The Tropical Cyclone Seroja Appeal has swelled to \$7.2million following a further \$500,000 donation from the Lord Mayor's Distress Relief Fund Board today.

A number of major corporations have also added to the total, including; Coles (\$153,185), Crown Perth (\$150,000) and the Stan Perron Charitable Foundation (\$100,000).

Presiding Chair Lord Mayor Basil Zempilas visited the region today, along with Emergency Services Minister Reece Whitby.

Mr Zempilas said the generosity of West Australians and West Australian companies continued to shine through for the people in the Mid-West affected by this disaster.

"We know that this disaster caused catastrophic damage for many West Australians across a massive area," he said.

"We all saw the pictures from Kalbarri and Northampton, but residents from many more towns and farms in the region saw their homes destroyed and damaged.

"Many people in the region still don't have power to the homes yet and are doing it tough.

"While I understand these payments will not replace everything that people have lost, I hope that it will ease some of the financial burden.

"This Fund is unique in that every dollar the WA community has donated will go directly to the people and communities affected by this tropical cyclone.

"As the Presiding Chair of the Fund, I was pleased to announce that the Board had agreed to donate a further \$500,000, bringing the Board's total donation to \$1 million"

The 13 Local Government Authorities in the region will work with the Fund to assess and review all applications and help disburse money as soon as possible.
