Failure to install and maintain firebreaks in accordance with this notice may result in a \$5,000 fine.

Harvesting Operations

No harvesting operations are permitted on Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Years Day. A separate fire fighting fire appliance is required to be present in any paddock being harvested, chaining, raking stubble, straw baling and associated allied activities during restricted and prohibited periods. The fire fighting unit must be in a state of readiness and have a minimum capacity of 400 litres of water, a powered pump and at least 15 metres of hose with a minimum diameter of 19 mm and capable of delivering water though an adjustable nozzle is to be readily available to any paddock being harvested. All vehicles or machinery operating in a paddock during Restricted or Prohibited burning times must have a Fire Extinguisher as defined in the Act. A Fire Extinguisher means a device which comprises- a. a container filled with at least 7.5 litres of water and a pump capable of discharging that water, and which is in a sound and efficient condition.

A Harvesting and Movement Ban and Use of Internal Combustion Engines (except for the watering and movement of stock) will be imposed when the actual weather conditions reach a Fire Danger rating of thirty five (35). All such bans are at the discretion of the Chief Bush Fire Control Officer or a duly appointed person

Note — Attention of landowners is drawn to the fact that this order allows for provision of firebreaks in situations other than immediately with property boundaries subject to approval. The Chief Bush Fire Control Officer and appointed Fire Control Officers have been authorised to act for Council in this matter

BUSH FIRES ACT 1954 AS AMENDED

Notice is hereby given to all landowners/occupiers within the Shire of Three Springs that fire-breaks must be installed on or by 1st October and maintained of flammable material up to and including 15th March as per requirements in relation to Section 33 of the above

PROPERTIES WILL BE INSPECTED TO ENSURE THEY COMPLY WITH COUNCILS REQUIREMENTS

. TOWNSITES

On or before 1st October all town lots within the town sites of Three Springs and Arrino are required to be treated as follows. Where the area of land is less than 3,000m², the property must be cleared, mowed, slashed to a MAXIMUM height of 7.5 cm of all flammable material.

Where the area of the land is 3,000m² or more, a firebreak must be provided not less than 3 metres in width inside and along the whole of the external boundaries of the properties owned or occupied and all flammable material must be cleared a distance of 2.7m from all buildings and/or haystacks situated on the land and maintained free of such material until the 15th March.

FUEL STORAGE AREAS

On or before the 1st October all grass and similar material is to be cleared from such places where drum ramps are located and where drums, empty or full, are stored and such areas to be maintained cleared of grass and similar flammable material until 15th March

FARM BUILDINGS AND UNATTENDED ELECTRIC MOTORS AND HAY STACKS

Fire breaks at least 3 metres in width completely surrounding and not more than 20 metres from the perimeter of any building, group of buildings or haystacks, All flammable material must be removed from an area 2.7 metres in width immediately surrounding the building. All flammable material must be removed from an area 3 metres in width immediately surrounding an unattended electric motor site

UNATTENDED FUEL OPERATED MOTORS

All flammable material must be removed from an area 3 metres in width immediately surrounding an unattended fuel operated motor whether the motor is intended to be used or not.

RURAL LAND

Firebreaks must be provided not less than 3 meters in width inside and along the whole of the external boundaries of the properties owned or occupied: where this is not practicable the firebreaks must be provided as near as possible to, and within, such boundaries

BARBEQUES AND INCINERATORS

Gas and electric barbeques are permitted any time. Solid fuel barbeques and incinerators are PROHIBITED on days of VERY HIGH FIRE DANGER or above.

PENALTY

The penalty for failing to comply with this notice is a fine of up to \$400 and a person in default is also liable, whether prosecuted or not, to pay the cost of performing the work in this notice, if it is not carried out by the owner or Occupier by the date required by this notice

Time to shine in Consumer Protection Awards

There's a vast army of people in the Western Australian community dedicating their lives to helping consumers and tenants, and now is a golden opportunity for them to shine.

With nominations currently open for the Consumer Protection Awards 2022, I would urge advocates and promoters of consumer rights to step forward and lodge an online application before the closing date.

The awards shine a spotlight on the great work being carried out in the community, whether it is offering advice, assistance and education; lobbying for change; creating a greater understanding of consumer law; promoting safety products; or highlighting consumer issues generally.

There are four categories, three of which are named after prominent past advocates Rona Okely, Richard (Dick) Fletcher and Ruby Hutchison, while the Kidsafe WA category focuses on promotion of product safety and injury prevention for children.

Nominees have the chance to join a highly distinguished group of people and organisations that took out the 2021 awards, including Melanie Mitchell, whose almost three year old son Lachlan drowned in a backyard pool at a family day care centre in 2015. Melanie took out the Kidsafe WA Award for her work in lobbying for a ban on swimming pools at family day care services under the banner of 'Lachlan's Legacy', and as an ambassador for Royal Life Saving Society Australia.

The other 2021 winners were Francine Bell, a campaigner for additive-free food for children; Women's Legal Centre, which specialises in women's rights and justice; and reporter Gary Adshead who produced a feature story on the tow truck industry in WA.

Winners of the 2022 Awards will be presented with a cash prize and a trophy by the Commerce Minister and will be further recognised with their names engraved on a perpetual shield.

Nominations will close at 11.59pm on Friday, 29 October 2021 – so please take the initiative to nominate someone you know, or don't be shy about putting your own name forward.

Scammers sink sea container purchases

If you've been looking to buy a shipping container for storage, transport or even to live in, it's Important to watch-out for scammers making leaky promises.

WA ScamNet at Consumer Protection is aware of ten victims who have lost \$35,500 after they responded to online adverts for discounted shipping containers and transferred money to several websites that turned out to be fake.

The victims were even provided with ABN information of legitimate businesses, before being asked to pay for the container via bank transfer.

After the payments were made, minimal updates were provided about the 'arrival' of the containers, with some victims reporting the scammers had been demanding more funds due to 'delivery 'issues, or requiring 'customs' or 'insurance' fees be paid.

As WA ScamNet works to shut down the 'First Choice Containers', 'Container Discount', 'White Horse Towing Ltd', and 'Container Sales Au' sites, consumers are urged to steer clear and be alert to other fake pages that may appear in their place.

This scam is different to the shipping container investment schemes we have warned about previously, in which consumers are offered the chance to 'lease' a sea container on the understanding it will be re-leased on their behalf and provide returns of up to 20 per cent.

Key signs that a website could be operated by scammers are when goods are being advertised well below market prices and the only way to pay is via bank transfer.

It is important to only use secure payment methods such as credit card or PayPal, which allow you to dispute transactions when you do not receive the goods or something goes wrong.

Take the time to locate the website of the legitimate business and make independent contact to verify whether the offer is genuine.

Also do an internet search of the website and business and read the comments and reviews from other consumers who have used the same site.

Building Better Regions in Durack

South-West WA drought hub to broaden its focus

- The eight Drought Resilience Adoption and Innovation Hubs will be given \$20 million in additional funding
- This will enable the South-West WA Drought Resilience Adoption and Innovation Hub to expand its focus to drive agricultural innovation beyond drought
- The hubs will also be able to expand their remit into fisheries and aquaculture
- Trialling new technologies and practices is a high priority
- This builds on the \$66 million commitment to the hubs through the Future Drought Fund

The Australian Government is expanding the South-West WA Drought Resilience Adoption and Innovation Hub to catalyse agricultural innovation, drive commercialisation and create jobs.

Minister for Agriculture and Northern Australia David Littleproud said the Government has allocated additional funding for each Hub to develop regionally focused and responsive innovation and adoption strategies and to undertake activities.

"This investment is the next phase in the evolution of the Drought Hubs from being just drought focused to being focused on Innovation more broadly," Minister Littleproud said.

South-West WA based hub—led by the Grower Group Alliance—is one of eight established across the country in April this year through the government's \$5 billion Future Drought Fund.

"These hubs are key to unlocking the potential of the agricultural innovation system, enabling people to collaborate and deliver regionally targeted productivity gains.

"The hubs will build connections between researchers, technology developers, investors, producers and agribusinesses to drive innovation and digital technology uptake across industry and the supply-chain.

"The hubs will always be a shopfront for farmers to access innovative technologies and practices that enable them to be more prepared and resilient to drought.

"Now, as part of the National Agricultural Innovation Agenda, we are expanding their remit into broader agricultural innovation activities and outcomes."

Federal Member for Durack, Melissa Price, said the South-West WA Hub base at Merredin will become the flagship for agricultural innovation in this part of the state. "The hub has nodes located in Albany, Bunbury, Esperance, Geraldton, Katanning, Manjimup, Carnarvon and Northam which provides an extra reach for farmers".

"It provides a physical platform for stakeholders from across our great region to come together and translate research and knowledge to make real impacts on the ground.

"The hub already has an extensive list of members, and this is another great win for WA agriculture," Ms Price said.

"We are providing the right conditions to help the agricultural sector to modernise, improve, innovate and grow," Minister Littleproud said.

 - developing and supporting use of information and decision support tools that help farmers understand and respond to risks and opportunities
 - attracting commercial investors and supporting commercialisation
 - building regionally based entrepreneurial skills and leadership
 - linking in with the Research and Development Corporations, where it makes sense
- The hubs were established through the forward-thinking Future Drought Fund a long term, sustained investment of \$100 million each year to build drought preparedness and resilience.



IRWIN SHIRE COUNCIL 2021 ELECTION CANDIDATES SURVEYED ON HERITAGE & HISTORY



The Irwin Districts Historical Society circulated a survey to each of the five candidates standing for election to four council seats in this year's Shire elections, and the results are now in.

The survey was open between 30 September and 4 October. Four of the five candidates responded to the survey and the opportunity for speaking directly to electors with an interest in the history and heritage of the Irwinshire. The Society does not endorse any candidate, but makes the survey available to help electors make their own informed decisions when voting.

- Scott, Wyse and Tunbridge committed to know/learn what local places are heritage listed, local and State, and why they are listed.
- Scott, Wyse and Tunbridge supported developing an inclusive Shire heritage tourism strategy, the new Museum of Fishing and The Sea at Port Denison, and the conservation and adaptation of Dongara Town Hall and opposing its demolition.
- Scott, Wyse and Tunbridge supported acknowledging Irwin's Aboriginal history and heritage.
- All respondents were uncertain about a local heritage listing of the three nature reserves in the Shire, and Denison Common, and would like to know more about the implications of doing so.
- Scott and Wyse were uncertain about funding support for Shire-owned and privately-owned heritage places – Scott referred to policy and resource implications, and Wyse would want further information. Tunbridge committed to advocating for resources.
- Scott and Wyse were uncertain about sources of resources for education on Aboriginal heritage, although Scott suggesting applications could be made to the Shire's annual community grants program, and Tunbridge supported providing educational resources.
- Scott and Wyse (retiring councillors) were unsure about re-forming the heritage committee abolished in 2017, but Tunbridge (new candidate) supported its re-formation.
- Leonard asked electors to consider his record on heritage, particularly in regard to Denison foreshore.
