ENHANCEMENT PRINCIPLES:

Improve the pedestrian's experience by: planting shade trees, creating continuous footpath routes, enhancing road and rail crossing points, providing additional seating and direction signage, and reducing empty windows and blank walls.

Improving the appearance of the main streets through: building renovations and re-painting projects, enhanced window displays in all shopfronts, the addition of colour and interest through street furniture and community art initiatives, and softening and screening of utilitarian lots with landscaping and planting.

Create a character of activity and liveliness by: placing barriers onto the street when businesses open in the morning, creating seasonal "hot spots" to allow people to gather, developing a programme of street-side activities for the main street, and selecting a "brand" for the town and using this to create a cohesive approach to enhancing the street.

Improve the connection between the two parts of Three Springs, either by building a second pedestrian rail crossing, or installing accessible footpath links via Water St. At the most logical point for crossing Railway Rd, install a safe pedestrian crossing point with a median island refuge, lighting, grab rails and generous plan ramps.

Undertake a comprehensive tree planting programme between Railway Rd and the rail line to provide shade and greenery, and reduce bare gravel areas.

Formalise parallel parking on Railway Rd with kerbs and marked bays, and exclude vehicles from the play and interpretation area. Landscaping this area with shade trees and an area of grass near the playground.

New memorial enhancement includes upgrading the public toilet and constructing connecting paths to the play and picnic areas.

Link the pedestrian rail crossing to an improved Railway Rd crossing point.

"Hot Spot" Build on this attractive garden to create an inviting space for visitors to stop and enjoy refreshments. Hot Spot could include a free WiFi service for travellers.

Create a fully accessible pedestrian link along Railway Rd by improving crossing points at side streets with grab rails, generous plan ramps and landscaped median refuges.

Install new murals on blank walls, possibly with a theme to match the adjacent building's use.

Improve pedestrian connections at this corner, and enhance the streetscape with a landscaped verge.

Introduction

To ensure the project will be successful, and most importantly, sustainable into the future, it must be part of a broad vision of the town's future, and a commitment and motivation of the local community.

The process includes the key components:

- Design
- Organisation
- Heritage conservation, and
- Promotion.

DESIGN: The preparation of a 'Townscape Enhancement Plan' which sets out the vision for the town's future, including the town's character, heritage, and the town's future. The plan should be a strategic document, and not a detailed plan of the town's future.

PROMOTION: The town's future vision should be promoted to the community, and the town's future should be a shared vision. The town's future should be a shared vision, and the town's future should be a shared vision.

ORGANISATION: Establish a 'Townscape Committee' made up of Shire staff, elected representatives, local business people, and interested community members with the aim of promoting positive, incremental change, and monitoring and evaluating progress.

The Committee must be headed by a 'Townscape Officer' who will coordinate the project, and ensure that the project is implemented in a timely and effective manner.

Council Comment

Three Springs Revitalisation Project:

The original Three Springs Revitalisation Project commenced in 2013, following community consultation. In April 2020, Council endorsed the recommencement of the project to revitalise Railway Road.

Aspects of the project include:

- Upgrades to the Tourism Parking, War Memorial, Information and Truck Parking areas
- Kerbing and drainage
- Tree planting and planter boxes
- Bench seating
- Sealing

Drought Communities Programme:

Shire has been successful in its application for \$500,000 from the Federal Government's Drought Communities Programme. The funding will be used for:

- Development of Lovelocks Soak - \$100,000
- Development of Community Gym - \$100,000
- Air-Conditioning for Sports Club - \$30,000
- Development of Dominican Park - \$55,000
- Three Springs Revitalisation Project - \$150,000
- Aquatic Centre Lighting - \$40,000
- Solar Panels to ECLC - \$25,000

Local Roads and Community Infrastructure:

Shire will receive \$329,104 from the Federal Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program. This funding will go towards the Three Springs Revitalisation Project, and will be used to fund:

- Reconstruction, widening and sealing of the road
- Improve traffic flow
- Improve drainage
- Paths and fencing
- Landscaping improvements
- Car parking

Total funding of the Revitalisation Project is \$496,104, of which \$479,104 comes from the Federal Government.

Total Federal Government funding through the Drought Communities and LRCI Programs is \$829,104



Police News

Over the past fortnight, our local police officers have been involved in keeping the community safer with several good arrests and charges. Thankfully, none of these incidents involved people from Three Springs.

While assisting in Geraldton, our officers carried out a number of traffic stops. One resulted in a vehicle search, with a male being charged to Geraldton Magistrates Court for having a small amount of drugs in his vehicle.

Only a few days later, the same officers were involved in another vehicle stop in Geraldton. On talking to the driver, it became apparent that he did not have a driving licence and following a breath test, was revealed to be almost four times the legal drink drive limit. Absolutely unacceptable, and a timely reminder of why police carry out breath tests at all times of the day, as this driver was stopped before mid-day.

Unfortunately, we also had an incident where some damage has been caused to the beautiful Koi pond in the centre of town. An investigation is ongoing, but it is not believed that this was done by anyone from Three Springs, most likely people passing through. If you have any information at all about this, do not hesitate to contact the station as the local Shire is doing a fantastic job of making our town even more beautiful, and we won't stand for people coming in and messing that up. Explaining environmental approvals

Are you planning a project or development, [or changing the way that you use your land, which might have impacts](#) on our environment? If so, you may need additional approvals under national law.

To help you work out what you need to do, the Australian Government has developed an [information toolkit](#) to explain our national environmental law—the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* (The EPBC Act).

It is designed to protect our unique animals, plants, habitats and heritage places now and into the future.

The EPBC Act makes sure ‘[matters of national environmental significance](#)’ are identified, and any potential negative impacts on them are considered and managed before any changes in land use or new developments are approved.

Andrew McNee from the Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment says anyone unsure if their project requires approval under the EPBC Act should contact the department early.

“We’re here to help. You can arrange a pre-referral meeting with one of our staff to discuss your plans. Getting that early advice could save you a lot of wasted time and money, and help our environment.”

WA PROJECT A CRUCIAL BOOST FOR CRITICAL MINERALS SECTOR

The nation's critical minerals sector will be boosted by a Northern Australia Infrastructure Facility (NAIF) loan to develop one of the world's largest minerals sands project in Western Australia.

A NAIF loan of up to \$150 million has been approved for the Strandline Resources, Coburn Heavy Mineral Sands Project, north of Geraldton.

Minister for Resources, Water and Northern Australia Keith Pitt said the project would provide jobs and investment for the nation's resources sector and increase economic activity in the region.

"The project is expected to benefit the local region to the tune of \$922 million over 25 years and could create up to 315 jobs during the construction phase and up to 190 jobs during the operations phase," Minister Pitt said.

"It's also going to be a shot in the arm for our critical minerals sector, with products from the development to be used in items like ceramic tiles, refractory, paint, titanium metal and welding rod applications."

Minister Pitt said the Coburn project was one of a range of resources projects that NAIF had approved which would provide an extra boost to the Government's Critical Minerals agenda.

As global demand for critical minerals that underpin the world's advanced technologies continues to grow, the Government is committed to supporting projects across the sector's supply chain.

Minister for Defence Industry and Member for Durack Melissa Price MP said this announcement from the NAIF is welcome news for Western Australia that will bring many benefits to local communities.

"The Coburn project will provide a significant economic boost to the region and support local employment opportunities throughout the duration of the mine's projected long life to 2045," she said.

"I commend the NAIF for supporting this project and congratulate Strandline Resources for developing this critical minerals mine."

Assistant Minister for Northern Australia Michelle Landry said the Strandline Resources' Project is a prime example of the Australian Government's ongoing commitment to regional communities during COVID-19.

"The partnership between NAIF and the Australian Government will continue to play a critical role in developing Northern Australia as we move to a post-COVID economy.

"Projects financed through NAIF loans stand to deliver a much needed boost to local jobs and investment in regional areas, at a time when they need it the most," Ms Landry said.

NAIF has so far approved loans to a range of resource projects, across the iron ore, bauxite and potash sectors.

In addition to providing equipment and other resources, the NAIF funding will also help fund an alternative access road for residents in the town of Denham, who are working at the project.

First production is expected within 18 months of the start of project construction.

This loan means NAIF has now approved more than \$2.1 billion in loans to projects right across the north, with \$1.2 billion approved in the last 12 months.

Be cautious buying coupons

There's very little you can't buy with a discount voucher these days, with group buying websites offering massive discounts on everything from restaurant meals and holidays, to groceries and car services.

While everyone loves getting a bargain, it pays to be cautious before buying vouchers online, especially in these tough times.

As the economy gets back on its feet post COVID-19, some businesses may consider offering their services on a discount site for an instant cash injection.

Even though this may sound like good news, consumers should know that if the business is either unable to redeem the deal or fails altogether, in a worst-case scenario the voucher you're left holding may be worth little more than the paper it's written on.

That's why it's so important to always check the terms and conditions to see if the business or group buying site have inserted clauses about circumstances that may arise when you can't use the voucher.

We recently received report that a restaurant had rejected a voucher citing a change in policy due to COVID-19 restrictions – so if you're told similar, check the fine print to see if the t&cs allow for such a change. If not, the business is obliged to accept the coupon.

Consumer Protection would expect businesses to act fairly to resolve the issue however if you are unable to reach a suitable resolution with the business directly, your next step should be to contact the provider to see if they can assist.

Many providers have already developed FAQs on their websites and have dedicated assistance teams to manage these issues.

The t&cs are also worth checking for other restrictions, such as only using the voucher on certain days or times, plus any notice required for booking and it pays to be prepared for potential delays if a large number of people seek to redeem vouchers at the same time.

Receipt rules apply to cash purchases too

Some customers like to pay by card, while others prefer to splash the cash, but everyone is entitled to receive a receipt for their purchase no matter which payment method is used.

It is important consumers understand their rights and retailers know their responsibilities surrounding 'proof of purchase', after Consumer Protection received almost 70 enquiries and complaints in the last 12 months concerning businesses that failed to provide receipts for cash purchases.

Receipts must be issued for all purchases of \$75 or more (excluding GST) regardless of whether payment was made by cash or card.

For purchases less than \$75, a customer is still entitled to request and receive a receipt, which must be provided within seven days.

The receipt must include the supplier's name, the ABN or ACN, the date of supply, the product or service purchased, and the total price.

Receipts can take several forms – they can be handwritten, issued by a machine at the point of sale, or as a GST tax invoice.

Other types of proof of purchase may include:

- credit or debit card statement
- a lay-by agreement
- a receipt or reference number given for phone or internet payments
- a warranty card showing the supplier's or manufacturer's details and the date and amount of the purchase

a copy or photograph of the receipt.

So long as you can reasonably demonstrate that you purchased an item, a business may be breaking the law if it denies your right to a refund, repair or replacement for an item that fails to meet a consumer guarantee.


